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Shoshone OHV Trail System



- 21 miles of new, professionally-built trailhead plus 9 miles of primitive roads.
- Trailhead area with mapping
- Warm-up loops
- High desert ecosystems of pinion, juniper and sagebrush; basin and range views



A unique OHV experience

Located about 25 miles south of Battle Mountain in north-central Nevada, the Shoshone OHV Trail System offers a remote experience with outstanding views of majestic mountain ranges. For adventurers who want to get away from it all, yet see it all, this is the perfect place to ride. This exciting trail system climbs to nearly 8,000 feet and travels through a variety of high desert ecosystems including piñon, juniper and a wide variety of sagebrush. It's designed for both motorcycles and four-wheeled vehicles less than 50" in width.

The Shoshone OHV Trail System is a high-quality trail system that is sustainable and provides environmental protection. By sharing a common vision and complying with some simple rules, you, your children, and your grandchildren will have a safe and enjoyable place to ride.

The Redrock Trailhead offers parking for big rigs, primitive camping, a concrete vault toilet, a learner loop, and warm-up loops. A kiosk and picnic tables will be installed in 2011.

The trail system is open all year, however snow and mud inhibit access during the winter and wet seasons. To minimize potential disturbance to wildlife, cattle, and wild horses, use is encouraged from July 1 through November 30.

Read and heed all signs and posters and talk to fellow riders if you see activities that jeopardize the trail system. The future of this system depends on the riders. Respect the land, the wildlife, and the rights of others.



Camping

Developed camping is provided about six miles north of Redrock at the Mill Creek Recreation Site. Mill Creek runs throughout the year, so this site is like an oasis in the desert with greenery and shade trees. Camping is allowed at the Redrock OHV Trailhead and dispersed camping is allowed throughout the Shoshone OHV Trail area.

Campfires are permitted, but they must be in a cleared area and contained by a non-combustible fire ring. Please keep them small and don't leave unattended. High winds and dry conditions can fuel

a wildfire even at unlikely times of the year. Spark arrestors are required year-round on your OHVs, chainsaws, and generators. In the heat of the summer, there may be restrictions on campfires, smoking, BBQs, and off-road use, so please check for any regulations prior to your visit. The use of fireworks on BLM land is prohibited year-round.

Organized, responsible groups are encouraged to enjoy the beauty of the Shoshone. Large groups or commercial events may be required to obtain a permit. Please contact the Mount Lewis Field Office at 775- 635-4000 for more information.
